
Project History

- 1995 National Highway System Designation Act identifies CFX in Virginia as High Priority Corridor
- 2000 Draft Environmental Impact Statement for 4-lane divided highway on new location; Location Public Hearing; CTB endorses Alternative F1 and designates the future CFX as U.S. Route 121 in Virginia
- 2000 FHWA issues ROD for Alternative F1

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- 2001 PPTA proposal, corridor revisions to take advantage of coal reserves to offset construction costs; Corridor split into sections of independent utility for environmental reevaluations
- 2008 U.S. Route 121 Section IIIA (Hawks Nest) & Section IIIC (Rockhouse) Reevaluations approved by FHWA
- 2009 U.S. Route 121 Section I (Pound Bypass) Reevaluation approved by FHWA
- 2012 U.S. Route 121 Section II Environmental Assessment (CTB endorsed alignment change in Feb 2013); SEIS currently underway
- 2014 U.S. Route 121 Section IIIB Environmental Studies document to assess proposed changes to alignment

Study Area / Project Location




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U.S Route 121 Section IIIB

- Extends approximately 13.7 miles from Route 614 to Route 643 in Buchanan County
- Proposed changes to this section are within the study area of the FEIS but extends outside of the approved F1 corridor at points
 - Approximately 30% of the total length overlaps with the approved F1 corridor
 - Remainder is generally parallel or offset by up to 1.5 miles
 - Modification provides a connector to existing Route 460 at Grundy, approximately 1.2 miles long
- Environmental Studies document prepared to assess:
 - Environmental consequences resulting from proposed change
 - Changes in the affected environment



U.S. Route 121 IIIB Project Corridor: Approved vs. Proposed




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Relationship between ADHS Corridor Q and Section IIIB of U.S. Route 121

- Submitted on behalf of themselves, Sierra Club, Appalachian Voices, and Southern Appalachian Mountains Stewards
- Believe that a single, comprehensive SEIS is necessary to analyze the fundamental changes in the nature of the U.S. Route 121 project to allow for surface coal mining and the coal synergy partnership
- Believe that the SEIS must analyze a full range of alternatives, including alternatives that do not involve coal mining
