MINUTES OF THE MEETINGS OF THE  
STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION OF VIRGINIA, HELD  
AT BRISTOL, JULY 21ST, JO' VILLA, JULY 22ND,  
AND ABINGDON, JULY 23RD, AND AN INSPECTION  
TRIP JULY 21ST, 22ND, 23RD, 1921.

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The State Highway Commission with Messrs.  
Tade R. Masie, Chairman, Henry P. Beck, Secretary, and  
Horace Hardaway in attendance met in the Hotel Bristol,  
Bristol, Virginia, on Thursday morning July 21st, 1921.

Commissioner Davis was absent on account  
of sickness.

Highway Commissioner Coleman recommended  
the award of the following contracts, via:

Project No. 114, Route No. 5, 4.973 miles Concrete between Bobrill and Sussex County Line, to Allport Construction Company	\$ 127,968.41
Project No. 121, Route No. 5, 6.313 miles Concrete between Bobrill and Courtland, to Allport Construction Company	181,333.06
Project 105, Route No. 9, 121.6 miles Bitu- minous Macadam between Charlottesville and Githam, to H. H. George, Jr. Or - provided a convict labor camp can be arranged for, amount of this contract	{ 393,044.64 { 368,219.92
Project No. 115, Route No. 9, 3.29 miles Bituminous Macadam between Ivy and Woods Crossing to C. S. Luck & Sons	101,450.01
Project No. 90, Route No. 3, 7.65 miles Soil Road between Henry County Line and Sydersville, to Porter & Peck	45,979.38

The recommendations of the Highway Commissioners  
were approved by the Commission, and the Commissioner authorized

to let the contracts, as above, with the following understanding:

Project No. 105 - Since the amount available for this work is \$300,000, this contract to be let with the privilege of stopping the work on the expenditure of \$300,000, but with the understanding that if a sufficient amount is available from next year's funds the work would be continued to the end.

Project No. 115 - Since the amount available for this work is \$100,000, the Commission allocated \$1,450.01 the additional amount required to cover this contract.

Projects Nos. 114 and 131 were let, conditioned on the ability of Southampton County to dispose of its bond issue of \$227,200, the remaining amount to be taken from the 1921 One Mill Tax.

The Commission then adjourned and proceeded by automobile over Route No. 10 to Gate City, Speers Ferry, Chind sport and Duffield, where they boarded Southern Railway train to Big Stone Gap. From this place the Commission took the L. & N. train to Ben Hur, and proceeded by bus from Ben Hur to Jonesville, where they remained for the night.

The Highway Commission with Messrs. Wade H. Maassie, Chairman, Henry P. Beck, Secretary, and Horace Hardaway in attendance met in the Lee County Court House at Jonesville on Friday evening, July 22nd, 1921, to hear the appeal of

certain freeholders of the County of Lee, protesting against the location of that portion of Route No. 10 between Jonesville and Rose Hill, as determined by George P. Coleman, Highway Commissioner.

After an extended hearing which was attended by a large number of citizens of Lee County, the Chairman of the Commission declared the meeting adjourned, and announced that the Commission would decide the matter at as early a date as possible, and that the Commission's decision would be communicated to the proper authorities of Lee County.

Previous to this meeting the Highway Commission, accompanied by a number of officials and citizens had made a careful inspection of the Powell River Route and also of the old Pinhook Turnpike from Jonesville to Rose Hill.

From Jonesville the Highway Commission, accompanied by George P. Coleman, Commissioner, proceeded over Route No. 10 to Pennington Gap, and thence over Route 11 to Norton, where the Commission remained for the night.

On Saturday morning, July 23rd, the Highway Commission proceeded from Norton over Route No. 11 as far east as Rosedale in Russell County. After stopping at Lebanon for a short time for a conference with the County officials, the Highway Commission proceeded to Hensontown, thence over Route No. 10 to Abingdon, inspecting the con-

struction in progress on this route.

The State Highway Commission with Messrs.  
Wade H. Masie, Chairman, Henry P. Beck, Secretary, and  
Horace Hardaway in attendance met in the Hotel at Abingdon  
on Saturday evening July 23rd, 1921, and proceeded with  
the transaction of general business.

The minutes of the meetings of July 5th  
and 6th were read, and on motion of Mr. Hardaway were  
approved, and the Chairman authorized to sign the same  
as correct.

Wilton T. Elliott of Suffolk, was elected a  
member of the State Traffic Police force at a compensation  
of one dollar per year.

On motion of Mr. Hardaway an additional allo-  
cation of \$4,816.10 was made to Project 24, Route 14; and  
also an additional allocation of \$4,794.00 to Project 5-94,  
Route 14, for extending, resurfacing, and completing this  
project.

After further discussion of routine Highway  
business the Commission adjourned, subject to the call of  
the Chairman, and the members of the Commission departed for  
their various homes.
